

Post 245 remains a strong, vibrant presence in the community

This September we celebrate 100 years of the American Legion's presence in Cross Plains. Not too shabby a milestone for any organization, let alone a non-profit serving veterans and local community.



The American Legion, organized in 1919 by among others Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., was a resource for war-weary, disabled, unemployed veterans coming home in waves from battlefields in France. Fifteen war veterans returned home to start Post 245 in Cross Plains. As its strength grew, the American Legion became a powerful political group which can be credited for bringing about programs like the GI Education Bill, VA hospitals, veterans employment programs, post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) research, and service-related disability programs to name just a few.

Seeing our nation's defense as a priority, the American Legion launched programs to promote health and military readiness for the country's youth. Scholarships, American Legion baseball, youth oratorical contests, marksmanship programs, government leadership courses and camps, all have long histories in the American Legion, and enjoy strong success today because of motivated volunteer Legion members and family which include our spouses, mothers, sisters and daughters which make up our Auxiliary, and the Sons of the American Legion.

The Legion Hall in Cross Plains has the pictures of 42 post commanders, from Joseph Meyer who served 1924 and 1925, right through to my own, as I presently am serving my third year as commander. I cannot recount for you the efforts that went into the development of our post building, the picnic shelter, the war memorial, or the ballpark. This heavy lifting was done by those who have gone before me and has been documented through Cross Plains' history and word of mouth stories of our senior members. I enjoy the accomplishments of selfless volunteers who organized, fund-raised, and sweated the work of building a beautiful facility which is the envy of visitors when we host legionnaires from around the state.

As you read on, you will read some of the history and current status of our community programs from our committee mem-

bers. As a post, the Cross Plains-Middleton group actively awards scholarships to high schoolers pursuing college degrees. These are paid for in part through our flag program, wherein businesses and citizens can make a donation to have a large flag delivered to be flown on their property during national holidays, and the flag is retrieved afterwards by volunteers.

Outreach to youth besides scholarships includes American Legion baseball and softball, Badger Boys and Badger Girls youth camps, Dane County Government days, oratorical contests on the topics of the US Constitution (with scholarship prizes), and Halloween celebrations.

Our post serves as the metal recycling center for the community, and when you drop off your water heater, soda cans, or old swing set for instance, each is hefted into a trailer and brought to a facility by volunteers who make these runs weekly. The monies received from this effort support our cause.

We have a sizeable cache of wheelchairs, walkers, canes, etc. which have been donated by members of the community for use by members of the community. This durable medical equipment is kept in good repair and is available for issue just for the asking.

The respectful retirement of flags is done at our post, and there is a deposit box just outside our front door.

Our Hall is available for community groups to use and is available to the public for low rental fees. It's hardwood floors, kitchen, and bars have hosted many weddings and other celebrations.

In all that time since just after World War I, many local posts have been created and some have dissolved. In 2010 the Middleton American Legion Post ended its charter and joined with Cross Plains. While many veterans' organizations and clubs of other kids find waning interest, the Cross Plains-Middleton Kerl-Endres-Brannan Post 245, currently at 184 members, remains a strong, vibrant presence in the community.

In my short tenure as commander, I have been awed by the efforts of a small group of committed people who show up to present rifle honors at veteran funerals, who volunteer at the VA hospital, who keep the facilities and memorial in good working order, who meet with coaches and leaders to organize community programs, and who cook and clean to provide veterans a really nice place to feel welcome and appreciated. Kids play in the park, people show up and cheer veterans marching in the Memorial Day

Some history of Kerl-Endres-Brannan **American Legion Post 245**

When young F.X. Fredrick arrived in bought their present site. Cross Plains in 1860, there were only two or three buildings in the settlement at that time. It was called Christina.

Mr. Fredrick rented a little shack for his harness shop. Soon the young harness maker became acquainted with the Benzmuller family, who had immigrated to the area about four years earlier.

In September he married their daughter Susanna. Soon after their marriage, Mr. Fredrick built his harness shop and a lovely rock home on a spacious city block. When the Fredricks moved to Ashland, the home was sold to John Virnig, who later sold the building to the American Legion in 1937.

The Kerl-Endres-Brannan American Legion Post 245 was organized in 1924 and held its first meeting in the Chas. Meyers Hall. The first commander elected to the post was Joseph C. Meyer, and the first Adjutant was Engelbert Boehnen. Boehnen held that office for 28 years until his death in 1953.

The second meeting of Post 245 was held in the old fire house. Legion members then moved above the Faust Barber Shop and held their meetings there until 1937 when they

Charter members of the organization were: Joseph Boehnen, Frank Coyle, Tom Coyle, Theo Falkenstein, Jac. Ferris, Engel Faust, Robert Faust, Frank Fell, Jos. Kalscheur, Jos. Meyer, Math Niesen, Victor Saeman, and August Stumpf.

The posts' first fundraising event was a dance on Memorial Day 1924, and netted the grand sum of \$65. The post also raised funds the first year with bird shoots and raffles.

On July 4, 1925, it held its first picnic which netted the post \$450. The first few years saw them sponsoring both a baseball team as well as a basketball team with August Stumpf in charge.

Post 245 sponsored a marching band for many years. This band was first led by Bennie Faust, and leadership was later taken over by Mrs. Vincent Saeman, which gained state and national recognition.

In the spring of 1937 the Cross Plains American Legion Post purchased the John Virnig property for the Legion Hall and Park. Old unnecessary buildings and fences were torn down and the property graded and landscaped to make an attractive park.



Several rooms were remodeled in 1938, and a flag pole was erected that same year. The old stone house on this property was used as a meeting hall and a place for social events.

After WWII, membership increased and a new building was begun in 1950 and completed in May 1951 at a cost of \$23,000, with the money for the new building lent to the Legion by Mr. Engel Boehnen. Actual work on the building began in May when the basement was started. Herman Simon of Middleton donated the forms and some help, and the Legion members themselves did the work in their free time. Local businesses donated many items for use in the hall, kitchen and bar.

The diligence and cooperativeness of the membership and the citizens in the community is evidenced by the fact that just nine years later, in 1960, the mortgage was burned.

The last half of the 60's saw Post 245 in a building program again. They added a permanent shelter house, a storage shed and an impressive new front which included a new kitchen and office on the ground floor.

Under the leadership of Buddy Schroeder, playground equipment was added to the park, and on summer days children in the community put it to good use. Post 245 also held an annual summer carnival, which was the highlight of the community for many

Several additions and much remodeling has been done through the years, with air conditioning being added in 1977. On Memorial Day in 1981, American Legion Post 245 held a dedication ceremony for their new Cross Plains Legion memorial, which still proudly stands today in front of Legion Hall. Additional storage areas were added in 2014, along with completing the upstairs bar.

In addition to its use by the Post and the Auxiliary, the new Legion Hall is now meeting the need as a community building and is used constantly for meetings of various organizations, wedding receptions and dances, and various other functions. The park surrounding the Legion Hall has also seen several improvements through the years, providing updated playground equipment, a ball diamond, and a shelter area with picnic tables. The War Memorial area in the park was completed in 2010.

Post 245 has two charters to the Sons of the American Legion organization. The first was in 1935 and continued active until WWII, when with its Sons themselves in the service and eligible for Legion membership, the charter was returned. In 1961 another charter was awarded the post and continues today.

The three men honored in the name of the Cross Plains American Legion Post 245 all served in World War I. Otto G. Kerl and Michael J. Endres both contracted influenza during the epidemic of 1918 and died. Earl J. Brannan died of lung trouble in 1920 as a result of his exposure to mustard gas.




Cross Plains American Legion Post 245 Hall pictured in 1974. Playground equipment was added to the grounds and was put to good use by many children in the community.

Sons of the American Legion serve local veterans, community

Legion Auxiliary supports veterans and their families since 1927

Kerl-Endres-Brannan Auxiliary Unit 245, Cross Plains is an organization whose aim and purposes are to support military veterans and their families – emotionally, financially, and physically.

We were chartered in 1927 with 24 founding members, and in 2024 have grown to 186 members. Our first Auxiliary President was Mrs. Joseph (Lavona) Bowar. The founding members were: Mrs. Anna Adler, Miss Florentine Adler, Miss Eleanore Adler, Miss Catherine Adler, Miss Marie Adler, Miss Henrietta Bowar, Miss Priscilla Bowar, Mrs. LaVona Bowar, Mrs. Eva Bowar, Mrs. Francis Doyle, Mrs. Michael Endres Sr., Miss Holda Endres, Miss Julia Faust, Mrs. Minnie Faust, Mrs. Regina Frank, Mrs. Regina Gorman, Mrs. George McKee, Mrs. Pauline Meyer, Mrs. Kate Saeman, Mrs. Kitty Saeman, Mrs. Catherine Saeman, Mrs. Kate Vasen, Mrs. Loretta Zander, and Mrs. Mayme Zander.

Over the years, we have had many programs that support veterans. Some of my favorites were volunteering at the Veterans Hospital in Madison, the Poppy Program, supporting delegates for Badger Girls State and the Josh Dog Program. Every Memorial Day we started with breakfast at the Legion, then traveled to six local cemeteries to pay our respects to those who have passed on. Darlene Schulenberg came up with the idea to have our chaplain place a flag on the gravesite of every Auxiliary member. We then joined the Legion and the SAL members to march in the Cross Plains parade. It ended at the American Legion grounds where the Post gave a Memorial Day program to honor those who gave the ultimate sacrifice. The Auxiliary awards a Virginia Faust and shared Legion/Auxiliary Scholarship to a senior high school student at the program.

Before the Village of Cross Plains grew so much, our Poppy Days were a lot of fun: we canvassed every home in town distributing poppies. We went in two-person groups and got to know so many residents. We were welcomed by them all. In addition, the village businesses supported our efforts and allowed us to put baskets of poppies for sale in their establishments. The funds from the poppy distributions were earmarked only for veterans' personal use. The Department of Wisconsin got 20%, our unit used the rest of the money for birthday gifts and



more for local veterans.

The Josh Dog program was to give a stuffed dog to children who faced physical problems, for comfort. The dog came with his own doghouse and storybook. The Cross Plains Clinic assisted us with the names of local families who qualified to receive a dog.

At that time, we had three Auxiliary members who volunteered at the William S. Middleton Memorial Veterans Hospital in Madison: Beulah Schroeder, Lucinda Coyle, and Joyce Clampitt.

The one thing we were most proud of is that a unit member, Virginia Faust, worked her way up in the Dept. of Wisconsin from Unit, County, Third District and Dept. offices to be elected as Wisconsin Auxiliary President. She was very capable, and we were so proud of her. That was in July 1995-96.

Bunco is a dice game, we played it after every Unit meeting, had tables of four, shook the dice for whatever number the head table said, then the winners would rotate tables. Then we would go to Shelton's and play euchre. My first night Phyllis Esser insisted I go. I told her I don't play it well and she didn't believe me, but after that time she knew I was right – they took it very seriously. At that time the Unit met on Wednesdays and the guys on Thursday, so on Wednesdays it was the ladies' chance for a night out while the dads babysat. I always said I was not a proper Cross Plains wife because I didn't have a euchre deck in my purse, and we didn't have a garden! At that time, Frank's Market was on Main Street and Bob said we could go across the street and get our produce!

Another nice program we still do is distribute either a poinsettia or a fruit basket to shut-in people at Christmas time. This is a joint effort involving Legion, Auxiliary, SAL, Cross Plains Community Chest, and St. Francis Xavier Catholic Church,


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Cross Plains American Legion Post 245 Memorial Project

The American Legion Post 245 Memorial Project was initiated at our Legion meeting on November 15, 2007. A motion was made to start researching and fundraising to construct a memorial in the park. When the meeting adjourned, Legionnaires got together to form a committee. That committee included Curt Faust, Don Kirner, Dick Williamson, Tom Foseid, Bob Hutchins, Gerry Boehnen, Dan Cady, Ed Pelowsky, Emily Statz, Mike Roessler, and Frank Kooistra.

There were quite a few doubts as to whether the donations would even get off the ground. A promise was made to the members that until we had \$100,000.00 in donations, we wouldn't start. Soon after, Elvira Sarbacker and Virginia Faust, members of the Cross Plains Legion Auxiliary, joined the committee. Within the next couple of months there were a few road trips by mem-

bers of the committee to view several memorials for ideas. In the end, we decided that putting veterans names on the memorial was a task that was impossible to get completely right – someone would be missed.


One of the hurdles was finding a chairperson, and we came up with an exceptional individual, who was also a SAL member -John Walsh. Well within a short time we had \$99,000.00 in donations. In the meantime, we approached a CAD class at Middleton High School to help us design the memorial. MHS teacher Brian Borstad and the students were excited to have a real project they could see as their own work. They presented the committee with five individual designs. They came and met with the committee, we eliminated a couple of the designs, and then were down to two or three to pick from. We combined what we liked from the remaining designs, and the students went back to the drawing board and came up with a design we felt very good about.

On June 19, 2008 we presented the final design to the membership, and a motion was made to accept the design. Granite was ordered by Pechmann Memorials, and Green Tree Services provided landscaping. A tremendous amount of help removing pillars at the park, and other work was provided by Boehnen Construction, who also provided assistance to remove the cannon, which was to be painted prior to being relocated back at

the park. There was a lot of concern from the community when they thought the cannon was gone forever!

Dick Williamson and Dan Cady were asked to appear on a radio talk show with Mitch Henck and talk about the new memorial. John Donaldson and the staff at the *News-Sickle-Arrow* were great supporters.

The new memorial was dedicated three years later, on November 11, 2010 at 11 a.m.





My first year as Commander at Legion State Convention, we had for several years won the Pendill award. Pendill was, as I remember, the 2nd State Commander and he must have been special as at that time the Legion Post who won this award would lead the Parade at State Convention. The year before we had won it but didn't know about leading the Parade. So my job was to let our members know if we were going to lead the parade and they would come and wear uniforms from their respective units. I proceeded to keep asking if we were going to lead the parade a lot of no's but I was persistent and yes we were going to lead the parade. I called and Post 245 showed up for the parade. We led the parade and the announcer didn't have a clue on who or why we were leading the parade. By the next year if my memory serves me, we won the Pendill again but they had a meeting at State that no Post would lead the parade. I had a little comment about that, I said those who voted to not lead the parade were members of the Posts that didn't do enough to win the award so their Legion would never lead the parade.

BADGER BOYS STATE

Post 245 sponsored three students this year. Badger Boys State 2024 was held on the campus at the University of Wisconsin–Eau Claire. This year's session ran from Sunday, June 9 through Saturday, June 15. We received thank you letters from all three boys, expressing deep appreciation for the opportunity provided by the American Legion Badger Boys State program, AND recogniz-

ing that Legion Post 245 sponsored them so they could attend.

AMERICAN LEGION BASEBALL

American Legion baseball remains as a long-standing tradition nationwide. It is the most successful and most visible youth program of the American Legion. Over 75% of college ballplayers and over 50% of major league players have played American Legion baseball during the course of their careers, including Lawrence "Yogi" Berra, Roger Clemens and Larry "Chipper" Jones, Jr. In addition to developing and promoting a spirit of teamwork, good sportsmanship, physical fitness and good citizenship within the community, being a part of the Wisconsin Legion program also allows for participation in one of five baseball classes. Graduating senior players have the opportunity of participating in the annual All-Star Weekend in Milwaukee.

Legion Post 245, serving Cross Plains and Middleton, proudly sponsored two Middleton High School/Legion baseball teams for the 2024 season. Both teams had a great season! Junior Legion finished 14-10. They went 2-2 at Regionals, but fell a little short and were out of the competition. The Senior Legion went 17-15 during the regular season and 12-9 in tournaments.

Special thanks to the Middleton Baseball and Softball Commission (MBSC), and Middleton High School baseball for organizing, managing and coaching the MHS/Legion baseball team. We could not do it without all your dedication and hard work. Also thanks to the true heroes ... the players! The talent of our Legion baseball players is truly awesome, and we know that it takes a lot of hard work and training to become as good as they are. They make the team a team! To the parents – another group of dedicated Legion baseball supporters – a BIG thank you!

AMERICAN LEGION COUNTY YOUTH GOVERNMENT DAY

County Youth Government Day is a field day experience at the county buildings that provides high school and middle school students with firsthand knowledge on how county government plays an important role in their daily lives. Elected officials provide insight on their roles and duties, and give condensed lessons on how the government operates within the county.

This year, Legion Post 245 sponsored students from three middle schools in Cross Plains and Middleton – Glacier Creek, St. Francis, and Kromrey. Legionnaire volunteers accompany the students as chaperones, along with the teachers. County Government Day 2024 was held April 18. Post 245 sponsored a total of 39 students, five teachers, along with four Legion chaperones. They also provided bus transportation and lunch.




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Flag program sponsors scholarships

In about 1984, Robert Clampitt proposed posting flags at businesses and homes, starting on Main Street. Within a short time, we were posting about 60 flags for Memorial Day, Flag Day, the Fourth of July, Labor Day, and Veterans Day. The program was later expanded to area homeowners.

Bob passed the job of organizing it to Dan Cady about 1987. We now have over 300 flags being posted on these holidays. After the attacks on September 11, 2001, we also post flags each year on 9/11, and post flags every fourth year on Presidential election day. Currently we have eight crews posting and retrieving these flags for each of these holidays.

With this program, each year we are sponsoring four \$1,000 scholarships, and another \$500 scholarship with the Legion Auxiliary, to make a total of five scholarships.



Whatever happened to the 'tippy car'?


it has been told the tippy car (also called 'Leaping Lena') was started during the Depression. It mainly was used in parades, such as the Legion State Convention parades, but was also used at weddings to take the bride and groom around town. It was rumored that at one of the state conventions in Madison, they drove it up the steps of the Capitol.

It could be dangerous; it has been said that riders in the back seat were thrown out the tippy car occasionally. Sometimes it would break down during a parade, and would

Around the mid 1990's, the Cross Plains Legion sold the tippy car for \$1.00 to Whitey Hillebrand, Greg Roessler, and Paul Lochner. Around 2001 it was wearing out and they couldn't find parts to fix it anymore, so they sold it for \$1.00. It is unknown where it is today.



The cannon in the park has been there long before I moved to town in 1967. There are a few stories I can comment on ...

I have heard stories from kids who played on the cannon growing up, and if they got hurt never a word was said as their parents probably told them several times to not play on it. We have playground equipment – we have had a couple of complaints from parents that their child got hurt on that – but never the cannon.

Now this is what I have heard from many Legionnaires: On Friday night the last weekend of June we had a carnival at the park, and to start the carnival legion members would fire the cannon about 5 p.m. I am not sure of the year but I think it was in the 60's. On one Friday night, legion members loaded the cannon a little too much, and the force knocked out several windows in neighboring businesses and homes. A collection was taken up and given to those folks to replace the windows. The cannon was then decommissioned and hasn't been fired since.

When we started the Memorial project in the park, the cannon had to be moved and we found a gentleman from Sauk City that could sandblast the cannon and repaint it. As we removed the cannon for painting there was a lot of worries that the cannon would be gone forever. We had to reassure them it would be back, just in a different area of park, but next to the Memorial.

Recycling program gives back to the community

The Cross Plains American Legion recycling program was started by Legion member Buddy Schroeder in his back yard before 2012. In 2016 with Buddy's health failing, I took over managing the recycling program. With Buddy's passing in 2017, the recycling operation was moved to the Legion garage.

The Cross Plains American Legion has recycled approximately 133,000 lbs. of metal every year since 2017. This takes a large amount of volunteers to sort and transport the metal to the recycler. I would like to thank the volunteers who have stepped up to help with these tasks, and also thank you to the people who donate the metal.

With the proceeds from the metal recycling, we give it back to the community, such as Badger Camp: a camp for people with spe-

cial needs; Camp American Legion: a respite camp for veterans with PTSD; Cross Plains swim team; Stuff the Bus: providing school supplies for needy children in Cross Plains; Cross Plains/Middleton Legion baseball team; Heat for Heroes: making sure veterans are able to have money to pay their heat bill; Cross Plains Giving Tree: helping people at Christmas time; Fruit Baskets at Christmas: given to people who have a serious illness, or who have recently lost a spouse.

I feel fortunate to live in a community where people look out for each other, to make sure a child has materials to work with on the first day of school, to provide a week's vacation for a veteran and his family who suffers from PTSD, or a child with special needs can go to a summer camp with other children who have special needs.




